Ash Wednesday

The season of Lent is a time of preparation for Easter. It is an opportunity for us to grow in our awareness of God's presence in our lives.

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is not a holy day of obligation, and yet it is one of the days during the liturgical year on which very large numbers of people participate in the ceremony of the distribution of ashes.

Ashes were an ancient symbol of repentance; they remind us of our mortality. On this day we recognize our human frailty. When we are marked with ashes we acknowledge our need to change ourselves at a deeper level and our willingness to enter into Lent as a time during which we will strive towards an inner conversion of heart.

We ask you Lord to be with us as we begin our Lenten fast and to help us to remember and to respond to your call to return to you with all our hearts.

Mass Readings for Ash Wednesday

First Reading (2:12-18)

A reading from the Prophet Joel

“But now, now - it is the Lord who speaks – come back to me with all your heart, fasting, weeping, mourning”.

Let your hearts be broken, not your garments torn, turn to the Lord your God again, for he is all tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in graciousness, and ready to relent.

Who knows if he will not turn again, will not relent, will not leave a blessing as he passes, oblation and libation for the Lord your God?

Sound the trumpet in Zion! Order a fast, proclaim a solemn assembly, call the people together, summon the community, assemble the elders, gather the children, even the infants at the breast.

Let the bridegroom leave his bedroom and the bride her alcove.

Between vestibule and altar let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, lament.

Let them say: “Spare your people Lord! Do not make your heritage a thing of shame, a byword for the nations.; Why should it be said among the nations ‘Where is their God?’”

Then the Lord, jealous on behalf of his land, took pity on his people.

Gospel

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Be careful not to parade your good deeds before others to attract their notice; by doing this you will lose all reward from your Father in Heaven. So when you give alms, do not have it trumpeted before you; this is what the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets to win admiration. I tell you solemnly, they have had their reward. But when you give alms, your left hand must not know what your right is doing; your almsgiving must be secret, and your Father who sees all that is done in secret will reward you.

"And when you pray, do not imitate the hypocrites: they love to say their prayers standing up in the synagogues and at the street corners for people to see them. I tell you solemnly, they have had their reward. But when you pray, go to your private room and, when you have shut your door, pray to your Father who is in that secret place, and your father who sees all that is done in secret will reward you.

"When you fast do not put on a gloomy look as the hypocrites do; they pull long faces to let people know they are fasting. I tell you solemnly, they have had their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that no one will know you are fasting except your Father who sees all that is done in secret; and your Father will reward you".

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
