Catholic School Leadership

On Friday January 27th CEIST was joined by ERST in hosting a national seminar under the title: 'Raising the bar in Catholic School Leadership' presented by Dr Ron Nuzzi of Notre Dame University in Indiana.

The event took place at RENEHAN Hall, Maynooth College and more that ninety Chairpersons, Principals, Deputies and other interested parties turned up for what was an exciting presentation by one of the great personalities in Catholic Education in the USA.

What was most rewarding was the clarity Dr. Nuzzi brought to the question of what characterises Catholic School leadership as we move forward into a time when our schools will be more differentiated by their contrast to what other schools have to offer.

Dr. Nuzzi made it clear that the unique Catholic content of what we do comes from theology rather than pedagogy, from what is Catholic about the Church rather than what is Catholic about teaching.

He said that what makes our schools compellingly Catholic relates to how we tap into the great mysteries of our Faith, Incarnation, Trinity, Paschal Mystery and Eucharist.

His advice to the leaders present was: know how your life articulates these four mysteries, the 'then' and 'now' of them, and the way they relate to your leadership and personal holiness.

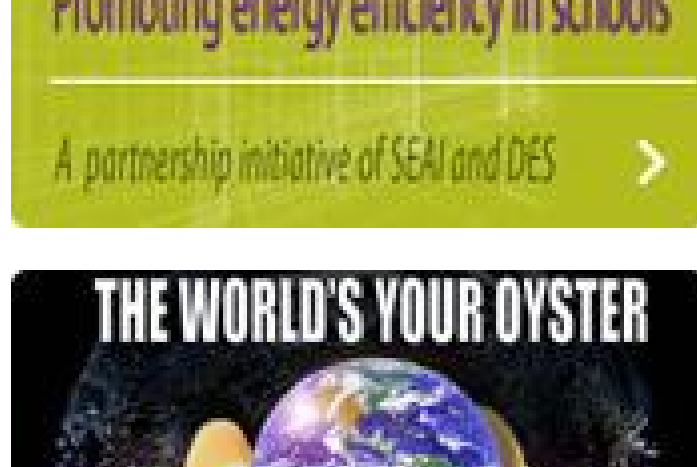
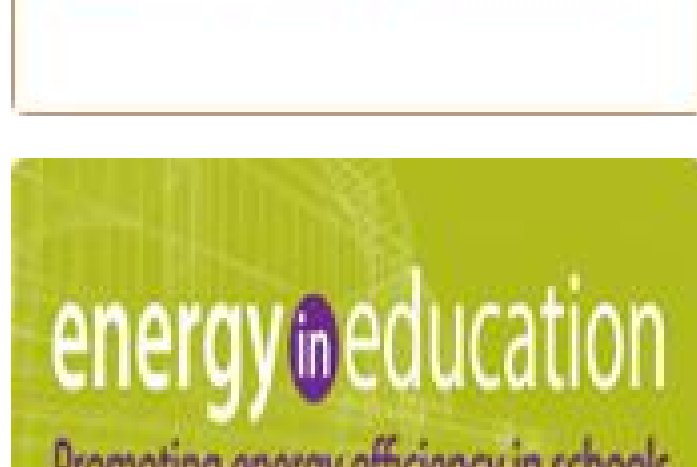
The Trust was delighted to offer a Welcome Forum to teachers new to our schools.

Finance Matters

Annual Accounts 2010-2011

Thank you to all our school Boards of Management who have submitted their annual school accounts for the 2010-2011 academic year. The Trustees have been very busy in reviewing and approving the accounts over the past few months. There remain a number of school accounts still outstanding and we would be grateful to receive these in the coming days so as to allow the Boards of Management to fulfil their financial obligations under the Articles of Management for Catholic Secondary Schools. Once the accounts are reviewed and approved by the Trustees a copy must be sent to the Financial Support Services Unit in J.M.B. by the end of February.

Annual School Budget 2011-2012

Following the reduction in D.E.S. Grants that were announced in December 2011, we would strongly recommend that Boards of Management review their budgets for the year to ensure that expenditure will not exceed income for the year.

The new grants payable to Non-Fee Paying Voluntary Secondary Schools are available in the 2011/2012 Financial Guideline 06 that was issued by the F.S.S.U. in January 2012.

CEIST Schools – Report on Capital Projects

The Trustees will be carrying out a survey in the coming weeks on our schools that currently have a capital project underway. This exercise will collect data on the financial status of each capital project and we will be issuing more details soon.

Two joint supplier workshops are being organised as part of a CS-COP initiative with Unity who are the ICT suppliers and Canon as suppliers of print solutions.

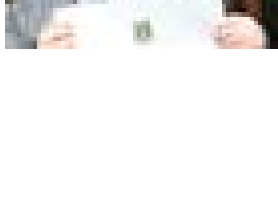
The workshops are intended to provide CEIST schools with knowledge on ICT planning and print solutions.

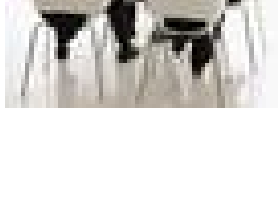

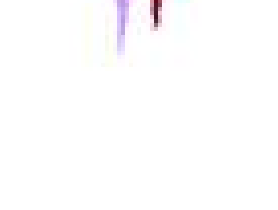

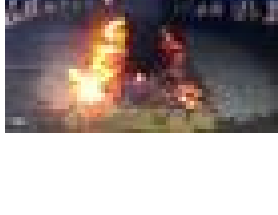


Our Lady's Castleblayney Win All-Ireland Schools Basketball title

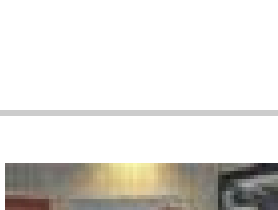

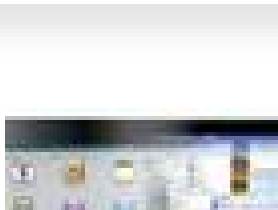

The programme content builds on four pillars: Theology, Spirituality, Psychology and Educational Leadership.

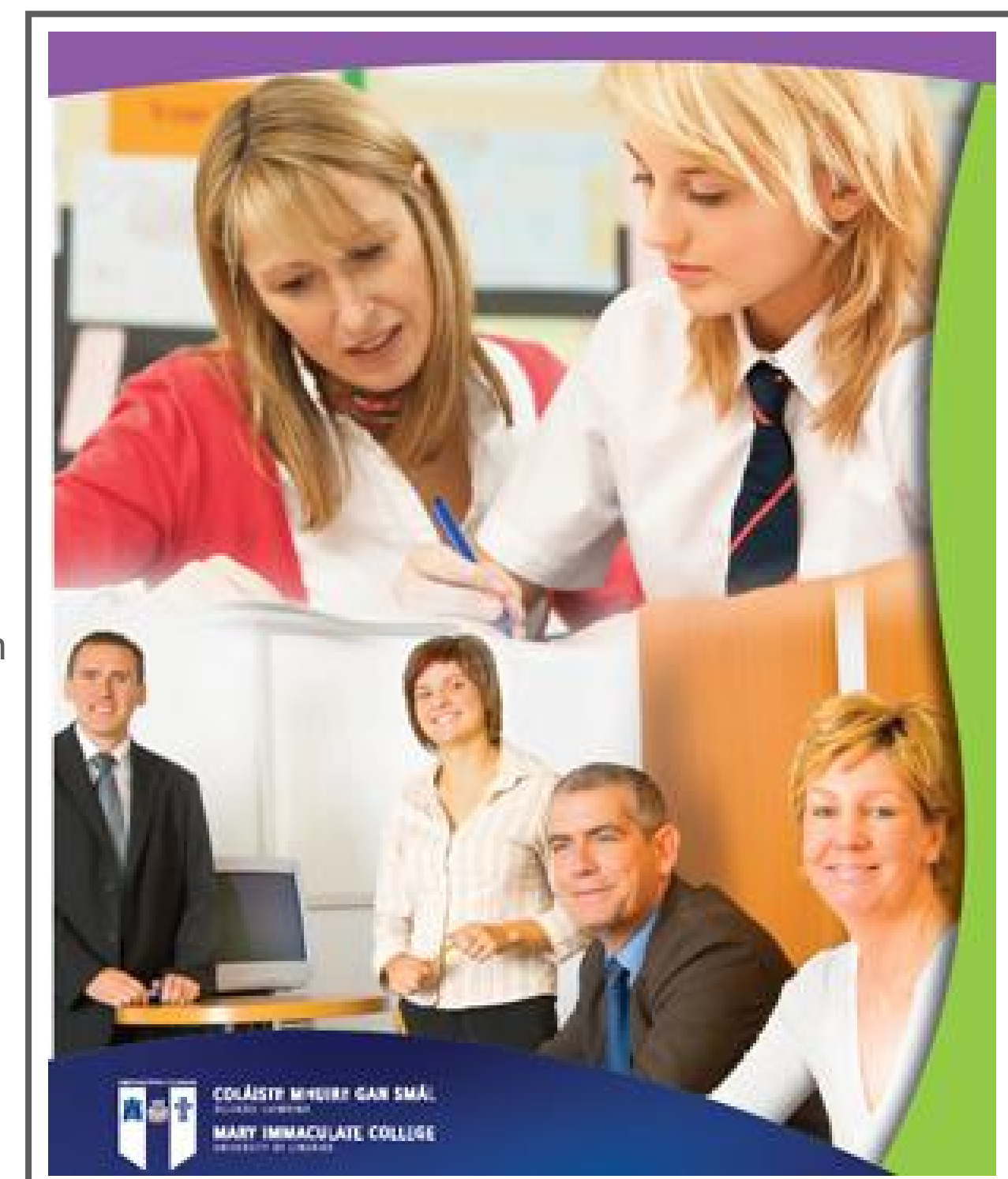
Who is the programme for?

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Mary Immaculate Secondary School, Lisdoonvarna motivated to upskill

Wednesday 4th January 2012

FROM SMALL beginnings, great things can sometimes grow. Mary Immaculate Secondary School in Lisdoonvarna, Co. Clare has become one of the county's centres of excellence for adult education over the last 15 years.

From modest beginnings, the school's list of courses has grown steadily over the years culminating in a number of FETAC Level Six courses being introduced in the school last year - with more than 200 day students and dozens of night students each year.

"We started off the adult education in the school in 1995 and at the beginning we were focussed on the basic night-classes, one day a week. But gradually then it began to get more involved and as the only provider in the greater Burren area we felt that we could offer more for the local people,?" said Marion O'Callaghan.

"We quickly realised that there was a huge demand from the general public for this and a lot of people were looking to up-skill or retrain in a number of different areas. We started off then with a number of post-leaving cert courses, especially in the area of tourism which is very popular in this part of the county.

Gradually it expanded on from there and we got more and more into other areas such as IT and computers and it has kept growing over the years. We have more than 100 adult learners at the school at the moment doing day courses and we have more again doing night courses".

Over the last number of years we have been offering FETAC level five courses in things like childcare, business studies, community and health studied and art and design.

We've had a lot of graduates who have come through these courses over the years and many of them wanted to go one step further but were not quite ready for college for one reason or another - so we decided to look at the idea of doing FETAC level courses.

Last year Mary Immaculate Secondary School took entries for two FETAC level courses for the first time in it's history. After a successful 12 months of hard study, the school recently hosted it's first ever graduation day for FETAC level six students.

"The numbers getting involved are growing and growing and quite a lot of people have gone onto third-level colleges and we have a number of graduates who have gone onto teaching or nursing.

I think it is especially helpful for families who have children going onto school or college and the parents have more time themselves to move on a bit further with it,?" continued Marian.

"The progression rate has been phenomenal - the number of people who have gone into employment or started their own business has been just phenomenal.

"But I think it has had an impact on people's lives that does beyond education or up-skilling. You might have people who might be out of the workforce for a number of years, because of family or for whatever reason, and this is great for helping to build up confidence again.

"There is also a great social element to this that you cannot ignore. The course allows people to get out of the house and meet people and that can be very valuable.

They all have different reasons for getting involved in further education and a lot of people might have started the course as a way of getting out of the house and then all-of-a-sudden realised that they really like it and they want to learn more."

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Mount Mercy College, Cork News Snippets!

Wednesday 4th January 2012

The following is an account of a recent trip by students and teacher to South Africa as part of their volunteering work with the Niall Mellown Township Trust. At the end of the page are photos from other events within the school.

We began Transition Year knowing we will be taking part in the greatly anticipated Y.S.I competition. We pondered over various issues we were concerned about but eventually decided on poverty in third world countries.

We researched many different charities involved in volunteering abroad but finally decided on the Niall Mellon charity who organise a Building Blitz every year in South Africa. We contacted Eimear Murphy who gave us invaluable help and advice through-out the year. We set out with the difficult task of raising over €22,000.

We put up a fundraising chart on our wall and made a real life shack and put it on display in our school. We had various fundraisers such as cake-sales, teacher baby photo competition, table quizzes, non-uniform days, coffee mornings, take-me-out night, bag-packing, sponsored swims, door-to-door collecting, raffles and many many more.

After a difficult but worthwhile 6 months of fundraising, we prepared ourselves for the interviews to gain a place on the Blitz. There were only 4 places available for students. Our teacher Alex Savage would be accompanying us on the trip. After a long interview the four places were awarded to Niamh O'Shea, Aoife Brady, Grace Kelleher and Eimear O'Callaghan. We had a further €1,800 to raise each over the summer to reach our fundraising target.



November came fast as we prepared ourselves for a week that we knew would be a life changing experience. We gathered in Cork airport and headed off on our flight to Heathrow and then our connecting flight to Cape Town. We arrived in Cape Town and each one of the Niall Mellon volunteers was greeted personally by Niall Mellon himself.

We exited the baggage area only to be greeted by a group of local people singing with banners, posters and signs that welcomed the new Irish volunteers. On the bus we saw our first glimpse of the stark difference between the wealth of Cape Town and the township life in the shacks.

That day we went to the site and listened to an inspirational speech made by Niall Mellon. We were then brought to our team house and welcomed by our team and the team leaders.

The following day we arrived on site at 7:45 and were allocated our jobs for the day. We were slightly apprehensive about the work we would be doing as we were unskilled, but everyone on site helped, encouraged and supported us throughout the week.

We never felt we were a burden and we always felt we were contributing and making a real difference. Aoife was involved in drilling on doors on hinges while Niamh was involved in plumbing assembling taps and baths. Eimear was involved in Plastering for the entire week as she had a flare for "floating" and labouring for the plasterers. Grace was involved in painting and enjoyed the comrade antics with the other painters.

We took part in shack tour on the first day for half an hour. Here, we witnessed firsthand the inhumane conditions of the shack people have been living in for over 15 years. It was truly remarkable the hardships these people endure daily. We worked hard with our fellow volunteers for the week for 9 hours daily in temperatures reaching 35 degrees. We were given the opportunity to visit a local Creche and play with the children.

It was devastating to know that the majority of these children suffered from HIV. It was hard to comprehend how we can complain about anything back home when you look at these people and see how they cope even though they have nothing.

We all participated in a group task of tiling a roof which was one of the most difficult challenges we faced while on site. With the high temperatures and the work load conditions were difficult but we were lucky to have our team mates to help us through.

The week wouldn't have been the same without the people we were working with and the friendships we made.

Every person on our team had a good heart and they were all genuine people who worked hard and supported each other through the emotional week.

One of the foremen, Mary, decided to paint the Mount Mercy crest on one of the houses. Eimear along with the other plasterers had plastered the house the day before, Niamh had plumbed inside, Aoife helped the carpenters hang the doors, Grace sanded and painted the doors and Alex painted the interior of the house.

We e-mailed the school to get a copy of the crest and organised for a volunteer who was particularly good at painting to draw on the crest.

We were very proud of our Mount Mercy house as we were all involved in the building and completion of it. We knew this house will be here for years to come and it would signify our hard work and the other volunteers' hard work, not just during the week building houses, but throughout the year of fundraising as well.

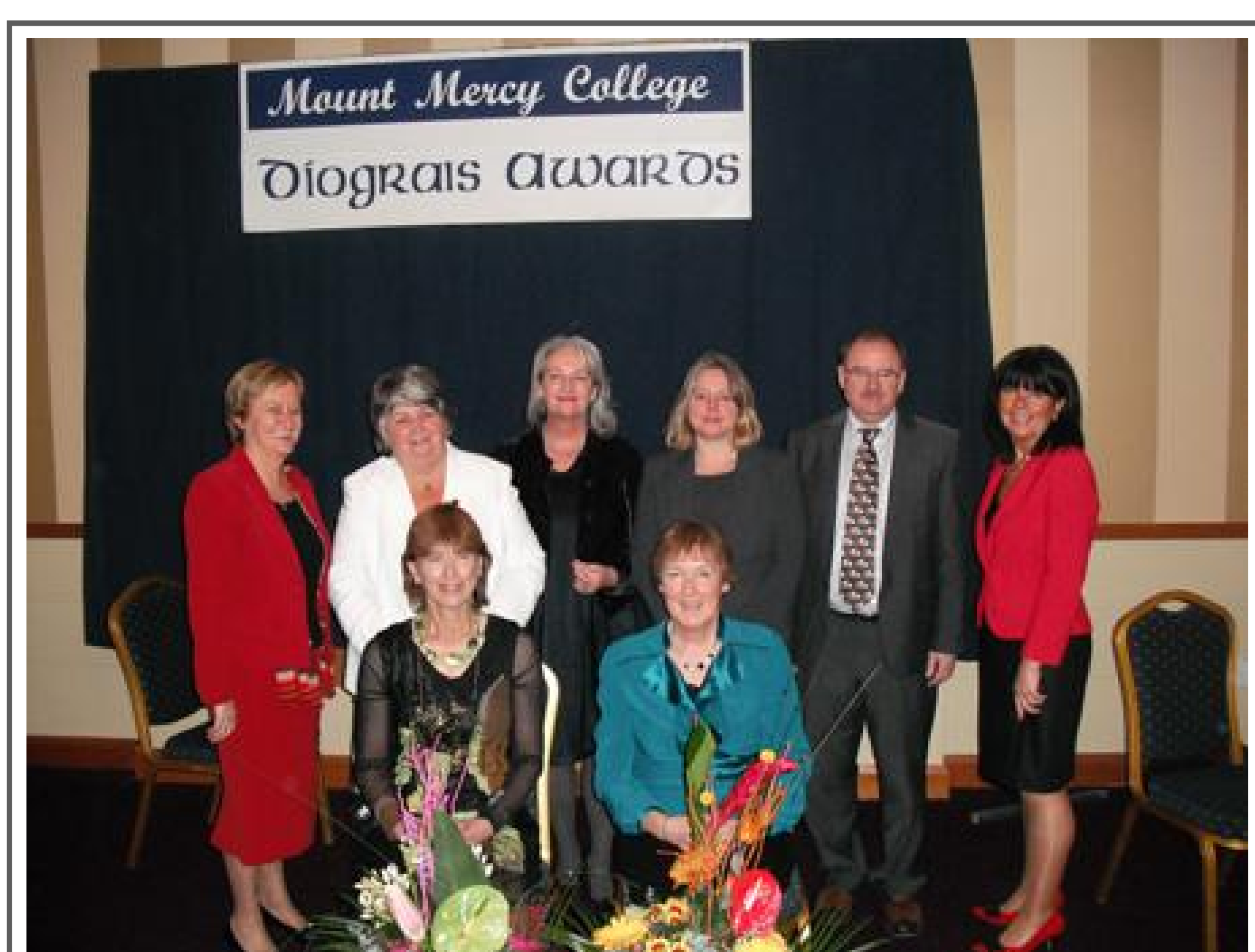

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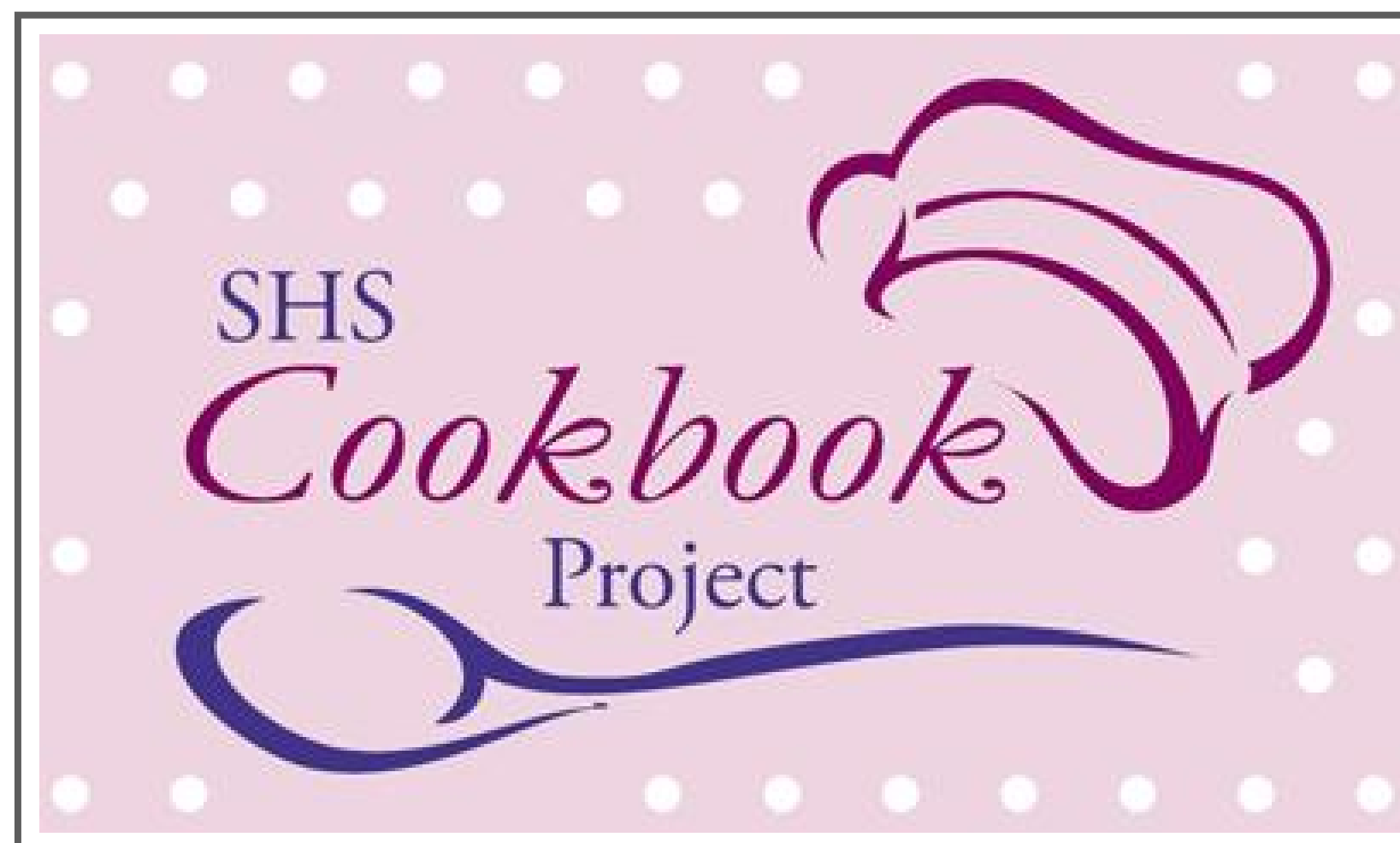
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Sacred Heart Secondary School Tullamore Cookbook
