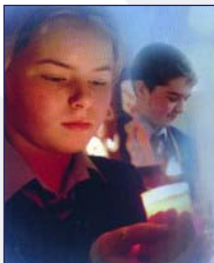

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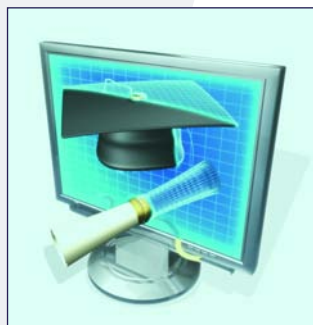

CEIST Schools Leading the Way in Innovation

CEIST schools are leading the way in Innovation by facilitating distance learning for their students through the use of technology. St. Joseph's Secondary School, Ballybunion, Co. Kerry is currently working on a most interesting project where it is sharing subjects through distance learning with two other schools. One of the schools is CEIST school, Mercy Mounthawk Tralee along with St. Michael's College, Listowel.



A virtual classroom is created in each school and the three schools can now offer the students a greater range of subjects. St. Joseph's can now offer Ag. Science to Mercy Mounthawk, Tralee and St. Michael's College, Listowel. St. Joseph's are also providing History and Physics, to St. Michael's College Listowel. Mercy Mounthawk Tralee will provide St. Joseph's with Chemistry. Everyone involved are very impressed and see this initiative as the way forward.

The Principal of St. Joseph's Ballybunion, John O'Donovan, talks as follows about the current difficulties schools are facing with providing subject options for students:

"For the past number of years many schools are faced with the problem of providing subject options for all students. In smaller schools like St. Joseph's Ballybunion we may have 2 to 5 students opting for a subject like Chemistry. We could not afford to provide a teacher for this number of students. In larger schools like Mercy Mounthawk they may have 30 students applying for Chemistry and with the restriction on class size of 24 this meant there were 6 students not getting their choice. I saw where St Fintina's Sec. School, Longwood, Enfield and Dunshaughlin Community School were sharing a subject through distance learning.

I discussed setting up a link between St. Michael's College Listowel and St. Joseph's Ballybunion and Mr. Mulvihill agreed. John O'Roarke Mercy Mounthawk also came on board. Mr. O'Roarke worked over the summer on this project and we are currently linked to each other through the server in our school. This I feel is the beginning of bigger and better subject sharing in the future. It is exciting to see two CEIST schools linking up with each other and helping one another out."

Another CEIST school, Killina Presentation Secondary School in Offaly was selected recently for an exciting pilot science teaching project. The D2D project involves the sharing of science classes between students in Killina Presentation Secondary School and Researchers in the Georgia Institute of Technology. This provides the students with access to world-class

researchers in areas such as nanotechnology, biotechnology, astronomy and using the video conferencing facilities where the students can ask questions and in some cases remotely control some of the equipment using computers and also see what the researchers are seeing, for example – the view using Georgia Tech's electron scanning microscope, which is one of the most powerful in the USA. The project is facilitated by Atlantic Corridor, a Midlands based development agency, Georgia Tech Research Institute, Atlanta Georgia and NIS, an IT services company based in the Midlands.

Killina Presentation Secondary School was one of 75 schools selected to take part in the 100mpbs Post Primary Schools Project, launched by the Government, which sets out to deliver high-speed broadband connectivity to schools across the country. As a result of this high speed internet connection the school had the infrastructure to develop the D2D project with Georgia Tech.

Michael Nolan, Principal of Killina Presentation School said "This is a very exciting time for us here in Killina Presentation Secondary School and we are privileged to have been selected to participate in this pilot Science teaching project, Direct to Discovery. We are all aware of the importance of Science in education and we are confident that our participation in this link to Georgia Tech Research Institute will create a greater interest in Science and Science based careers among our students.

Health and Safety in CEIST Schools

School Caretaker Training

Health and Safety is of paramount importance in our schools. As part of our commitment to ensuring that our schools are safe places for everyone who enters them, the Trustees, in conjunction with Allianz plc, are holding a series of one day training seminars for School Caretakers in October 2010.

In order to minimise any disruption to our schools the training will take place during the October mid-term break from Tuesday, 26th to Friday 29th October 2010. Under current health and safety legislation this training for our School Caretakers is **mandatory** and training must be undertaken every two years.

The training will cover areas such as manual handling, general health and safety with emphasis on schools, fire safety, preventive maintenance and risk assessment. The training will run from 9:30am until 4:30pm with a one hour break for lunch. Certificates will be issued on completion of the course.

You should by this stage have received correspondence from the CEIST Office along with a booking form and we would kindly request that you complete and return as soon as possible so that hotel bookings and numbers can be secured.



Health and Safety Checklist

Health and Safety is a legal requirement as well as being an important aspect of good corporate governance. Poor safety and health may lead to expensive compensation claims and involve criminal prosecutions of the school, its Management and Staff.



The Safety Statement makes clear how the safety of employees, students, parents, visitors and other persons is organized in a safe learning environment.

The Trustees require that all Boards of Management have in place a professionally prepared Safety Statement and Risk Assessment and that these are updated to reflect changes, legal, environmental and structural.

As we commence a new year it is a good time to ensure that your school is legally compliant. To this end there is a checklist available to assist you. Please print out the checklist entitled **"Policies and Arrangements for Health and Safety in Schools"** and complete the form. You should sign and date the form and retain on file and ensure that corrective action has been taken where necessary. The checklist is available in the Members' Area (resources section) of the CEIST website.

Presenter: Amalee Meehan

Amalee's approach is that of an interactive reflection. Using music, art, literature, Scripture and good conversation around people's own life experience, Amalee guides the group into the world of Christian spirituality and its relevance for teachers today. Space for the Spirit is an adaptation of the first week of Joining the Dots: Life, Faith, Teachers, Teaching and Theology – a six week programme in theology and spiritual renewal for teachers.
