We remember and pray for our Faithful Departed in a special November Mass or Service of the Word. Respecting Public Health norms, the Service of Remembrance may be without a congregation or with very limited numbers and streamed online.

The Paschal Candle is burning and candles for all our parishioners who have died over the past year are lit. The names of our departed loved ones may be displayed and, depending on numbers, may be read at the beginning of the Service.

That we may continue in a spirit of solidarity and courage to face together the dangers of these times and as we remember all who suffer through Covid-19.

That all who have died in the past year, including all who died from Covid-19, may, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Lord, hear us.

That all in need may be granted grace with peace, justice and compassion; for all who bear the burden of poverty and homelessness, of loss of work, for the sick and all who are distressed in any way.

Lord, hear us.

Almighty and gracious God, our refuge and our strength, grant to all, living and dead, the fullness of your peace that you alone can give. Through Christ our Lord.

whose days are without end
and whose mercies beyond counting,
keep us mindful
that life is short and the hour of death unknown.
Let your Spirit guide our days on earth
in the ways of holiness and justice,
that we may serve you
in union with the whole Church,
