CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM

CEIST CEO MAEVE MAHON

In this third week of Advent there is a sense of joyful anticipation of what is to come. The lighting of the pink candle on the Advent Wreath and the priest's rose-coloured vestments signal that time is moving on. It is Gaudete Sunday — a time to rejoice as we come ever closer to welcoming the Christ Child into our homes and our world.

The readings for Gaudete Sunday are filled with hope, confidence, and joy. They remind us that our God is one who causes the dry lands to exult and the wastelands to rejoice and bloom (Is 35:1). The psalm proclaims a God who gives sight to the blind, raises up those who are bowed down, and protects the stranger. The second reading (James 5) invites us to a patience grounded in hope as we wait, while the Gospel (Matthew 11) assures us that the Lord is near and reminds us that faithfulness is required, even when the journey is not always easy.

As I reflected on these readings, I realised how deeply their message resonates with all our CEIST schools at this time of year. In every school this week there is a strong sense of joyful anticipation. House exams are over or nearing completion, school shows have wrapped up, a busy and eventful term is coming to a close, and the Christmas holidays are in sight. The pictures and words in our Christmas Newsletter tell the story of the many highlights of the first term, and each page reflects a genuine celebration of what it means to be a CEIST school.

Over recent weeks, our social media platforms have also offered glimpses of how CEIST school communities live out their values and mission — giving generously to those less fortunate, visiting nursing homes and day-care centres, spreading joy through Christmas jumpers, singing carols, and gathering in prayer throughout this Advent season.

This time of year can also remind us that the journey is not always easy. It can be difficult to trust in God's presence, particularly when tragedy strikes our school communities, as it does all too often. At such times, what we treasure in our CEIST school communities sustains us and assures us that there is always light in the darkness. The lighting of candles, gathering together in prayer, a gentle hand on the shoulder, and the support of a faith community enable us to continue to hope on the journey.

It has been a busy term in the CEIST office as well. Since mid-August, we have met with newly appointed principals and deputy principals. The team has worked closely with chairpersons and principals to approve 106 Admission Policies using the new CEIST template. We hosted our annual Conference, attended by a record number of delegates, which was truly a highlight of the CEIST calendar. COTHÚ continues to grow and Cohort II have begun to meet for their initial cluster meetings. For the first time, chairpersons and principals gathered together in network meetings, and the very positive response means this will become a regular feature in the future.

Over the past number of weeks we have also gathered with deputy principals. These sessions were largely led by the participants themselves, resulting in rich reflection, learning, and discussion. There have been opportunities for RE teachers to gather and be nourished, and for newly appointed DLPs and DDLPs to explore Child Safeguarding Procedures as they take up their new roles.

In October, forty-one new boards of management were appointed, representing a total of 328 members, of whom 220 (67%) were newly appointed. Twenty-two chairpersons (54%) were appointed for the first time. This is a wonderful testament to the commitment of local communities to their CEIST schools, and I want to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank all those who serve on boards of management. Your generosity in stepping forward to help lead and shape your school communities is deeply appreciated.

The recruitment of new principals and deputy principals began in June and continues right up to the final week of this term and beyond. It has been an exceptionally busy period for recruitment, and I wish to thank the Faith, Leadership and Governance Coordinators who lead these processes on behalf of boards of management. The appointment of a principal or deputy principal is among the most important responsibilities of a board, and the support provided by the FLG team is invaluable.

This term has also been a time of change within the CEIST office. We have said goodbye to our Director of Finance, Bernadette McKeown, to FLG Coordinator Rita McCabe, and we will shortly bid farewell to our Director of Education, Rob Halford. They will all be greatly missed. Their contribution and commitment to CEIST have been nothing short of extraordinary, and we wish them every blessing as they begin new chapters.

We were delighted to make two in-house appointments: Lisa Newman as Finance and Administration Manager, and Yvonne Bane as FLG and Primary Liaison for the south-west region. We have also welcomed Audrey Baneham Farrell as our new administrative assistant and are currently recruiting for a new Director of Education, as well as creating a panel for possible future FLG vacancies. The sustainability of an organisation depends on growth both from within and from without, and we are blessed that CEIST continues to exemplify this.

As I come to the end of my first year as CEO, it is with great joy that I look back on the many encounters with members of the CEIST community, my visits to schools, and my ongoing engagement with the wider education community. Thank you for the welcome and support you have extended to me at every turn. It has been a busy and fruitful year — truly, every day has been a school day. I have learned so much and look forward to the year ahead with confidence and hope.

As the term and year draw to a close, I wish all our school communities a happy, safe, peaceful, and holy Christmas. May 2026 be filled with many graces, and may we all return refreshed on 5 January.

It was a really successful week that strengthened our awareness of climate action, creativity, and community spirit.






Knock Retreat


Naughton Scholarship Awarded to Our Lady's **Student**




Mission Week 2025
